World Veterinary Day

The last Saturday in April we celebrated World Veterinary Day, and we thought it would be a great newsletter to shine some light on the veterinary profession and to get to know your Linwood Veterinarians a little better. The road to becoming a veterinarian is no easy feat. The average North American student requires an undergraduate degree before being accepted into a veterinary school. Followed by another four years of specialized professional education during veterinary school. There are currently 5 veterinary schools across Canada; Atlantic Veterinary College (AVC), Ontario Veterinary College (OVC), Western College of Veterinary Medicine, Faculty of Vet Med in Calgary and Faculty of Vet med in Montreal. There are other veterinary schools around the world but in order to work in Canada or the USA a national board exam is required to be passed. Unlike human medicine where only one species is studied, veterinarians are required to understand all major species; companion animals including cats, dogs and small furries (such as rabbits, rats, hamsters) farm/production animals including horses, cows, small ruminants, pigs and poultry. They even study exotic and wildlife medicine! Because the veterinary profession is so vast a lot of people graduate and go into an area of the profession, they are most passionate about.
